Dear Camp Staff:

The effects of Assemblies of God camps are felt the world over. Missionaries, Pastors, Evangelist, Deacons, Sunday School teachers, church and civic leaders have emerged from these camps with a call and anointing of the Holy Spirit upon their lives. Thank you for your commitment to Alaska's precious young people and your obedience to the Holy Spirit. It is our desire to see each boy, girl and adult that attends the camp come away with (1) a personal saving knowledge of Jesus Christ, (2) having personally experience Pentecost in their own life, (3) having found a fresh, new power in the Word of God for their life (4) having found a life long friend that exemplified the Christian walk in the those who ministered to them.

Alaska is rugged, remote, unique, and full of wilderness. Our camp is truly Alaskan in each of these senses. Prepare yourself for remote wilderness living. The nearest village is 17 miles and the only accessibility is by boat. The nearest city is 500 miles by air (Anchorage). Accommodations will be mostly unimproved with few to no amenities or conveniences. Daily life will be rugged on the banks of the Akularak River which flows into the Yukon River just down stream. The facilities consist of tents and all supplies must be boated to camp. The daily demands of this type of camp necessitates your physical fitness.

Spiritual fitness is of the utmost importance. The young people that will attend the camp will be primarily from Alaska's Yupik Eskimo. With a rich heritage in their own culture, it will take an anointing of the Holy Spirit to enable you and each member of the camp team to touch them spiritually and minister to them. Your personal readiness through prayer and Bible preparation will condition your heart, spirit, and mind for the challenge of ministry that lies ahead.

This manual is provided as a guide to prepare you and to help you understand what is expected of you. May the Holy Spirit anoint us together to serve. For more pictures go to:

God bless you for allowing the Holy Spirit to direct you to serve Western Alaska's Native youth at Camp "Agaiutim Nune." We trust that the following pages will prove to be a blessing in helping you be prepared for these days of great fun, fellowship, and ministry.

Your personal preparation should be a priority. Don't rely on past ministry but have a fresh touch of God on your life. Today's kids and teens present demanding questions and situations, with great moral, ethical, social, family and personal implications. Only being in touch with the Holy Spirit can equip us for the task.

Prepare yourself by examining your own attitudes. Guard your lips and attitudes about things you see around you. You will, for the most part, be in another culture. Today's kids and youth want counseling and true answers, not judgment and condemnation. Begin now asking the Holy Spirit for a burden and His anointing for the campers to whom you will be ministering.

Prepare yourself now for the rigors of camp life. Long days, demanding attention from the campers, spiritual battle, physical activities, some loss of sleep and maybe foods not exactly to your liking.

During this week of camp you will have opportunity to demonstrate the life of Christ. This is what makes camp a "laboratory of Christian living." You have the opportunity to not only tell, but show others what Christian living is all about. The camper will have the opportunity to experience first hand how to live the Christian life from your example.

What is Camp "Agaiutim Nune," translated from the Yupik Eskimo it means... "The Place of God."

Camp "Agaiutim Nune" is a place where campers become aware of God's marvelous creation through natural surroundings, and His love for them through His Son, Jesus Christ.

Camp "Agaiutim Nune" a place where every part of the program gives preeminence to the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

Camp "Agaiutim Nune" is an experience whereby old lives are made new by the power of the Lord Jesus Christ Himself, manifested in the lives of the campers through the person of the Holy Spirit.

Camp "Agaiutim Nune" is a place where prayer and the Word of God bring the solutions to life's problems and questions.

Camp "Agaiutim Nune" is a place to meet with God.

CAMP "AGAIUTIM NUNE" OBJECTIVES

- I. To appreciate campers as individuals, counseling them personally in the area of their spiritual need (note Jesus' example in John 3-5)
- II. To encourage definite spiritual decisions at the level of the camper and the camper's readiness.
- III. To help establish good habits of Christian living—in prayer, Bible reading and study, personal devotions and witnessing (2 Tim. 3:14-17).
- IV. To have practical experience in leadership, service, witnessing, and application of spiritual truths to daily living (2 Tim. 2:2; John 13:1-17; Luke 22:24-28; Mark 6:7).

In addition, Camp "Agaiutim Nune" seeks other outcomes related to total development of the camper, such as:

- A. The establishment of sound health habits: cleanliness, adequate rest, proper diet, wholesome exercise, and good attitudes toward the body as God's temple (1 Cor. 6:19-20).
- B. The profitable and wise use of leisure time apart from amusements.
- C. Learning skills as a means of developing character and as training for possible future ministry.
- D. Development of the ability to get along with others unselfishly (1 Cor. 13; Rom. 12: 9-21).
- E. Learning effective leadership skills (Ex. 35: 30-35).
- F. Learning responsibility for one's own decisions (Gal. 6:4-9)

PERSONNEL DEFINITIONS

Staffs and/or Coaches are in a general sense, anyone who is directly and personally involved with the interests and activities of the camper. His/Her chief service is to assume the oversight of a small group of campers, and to help them gain the most from their camping experience. He/She should possess the following characteristics:

- I. PHYSICAL:
 - A. Have health and physical stamina, a necessity to stand the rigors of day-long contact with kids/teens.
 - B. Be willing to get up in the mornings on schedule.
 - C. Have a nervous system able to stand noise and the stress of living with kids/teens.
 - D. Know his/her own physical limitations and be willing to abide by them.
 - E. Have good health practices. Be neat in personal appearance.
 - F. Be at least eighteen (18) years of age.

- II. SPIRITUAL:
 - A. Should be a Spirit-filled Christian.
 - B. Be able to share God with Campers.
 - C. Have the ability to show Christian attitudes under stress.
 - D. Walk close to Christ, engaging in daily devotions.
 - E. Accept the camping experience as a ministry, a service to Christ and His children.
 - F. Must know how to lead a camper to Christ; must be sensitive to the leading of the Spirit in this work.

- III. EMOTIONAL:
 - A. He/she should have a good degree of emotional maturity.
 - B. He/she should realize that campers' needs must come before personal pleasure. **CAMPING IS FOR CAMPERS**, not for the pleasure of the staff.
 - C. He/she should strive to show equality to all, without showing favoritism.
 - D. He/she should have objectivity in disciplinary situations, keeping from personal emotional involvement.
 - E. He/she must be patient.
 - F. He/she must have a sense of humor, must be able to laugh at himself, and be cheerful.

IV. SOCIAL:

- A. He/she must be outgoing and enjoy being with people.
- B. **He/she must avoid spending time with the staff that should be spent with the campers.**
- C. He/she must be willing to give of himself to the camper.
- D. He/she must be courteous to all and at all times.

V. ATTITUDES:

- A. He/she must show loyalty to the camp director, assistant director, native pastors/missionary, camp objectives, and other staff members.
- B. He/she must avoid criticism of others
- C. He/she must be determined to enjoy camp and find the pleasant side even on a rainy day or other disappointments.
- D. He/she must be able to cooperate and make adjustments.

STAFF DIRECTIVES

ATTITUDES:

1. Remember, you are not a policeman, but a Staff.
2. Have faith in each camper, and communicate that confidence: (Heb 6:9 KJV) “But, beloved, we are persuaded better things of you, and things that accompany salvation, though we thus speak.”
3. Remember, you set an example in all that you are and do this while at camp. Ask yourself: “Will young people want to commit their lives to the Christ they see in me?”
4. The Staff carries a burden for each camper in his tent, and will sincerely pray that each will be saved, filled with the Spirit, and wholly committed to Christ before leaving camp. Remember, for some campers, you may be the greatest spiritual influence in their lives.
5. Above all, LOVE. There is no greater human force to break down resistance, bridge all gaps, and effect an eternal change in young lives. Of all the qualities needed to be a good Staff, we can sum it up by saying, (1 Cor 13:13 NIV) “And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. **But the greatest of these is love.**”

HOW CAN I HELP?

1. Don't pry. Win the right to be heard. Be a good listener. Be available.
2. Be careful not to try to solve your camper's problems for him/her. Guide him/her into the Word of God where the Holy Spirit can speak to him/her and where he/she can find right principles for making right choices. Your campers cannot take you home to solve their problems. But they can take Christ, who has promised never to leave or forsake His own. (Heb 13:5 KJV) “Let your conversation be without covetousness; and be content with such things as ye have: for He hath said, I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee.”
3. Not all problems have a spiritual origin, but the camper will not find a permanent solution to his/her problem until he/she is in proper relation to Jesus Christ. Lead him/her to the point where the Holy Spirit can effect an inner change in his/her life.
4. A wise Staff will try to find out why a camper acts the way he/she does (particularly a problem camper). Rather than automatically disciplining or treating a manifestation behavior, seek it's cause.
5. Be shockproof. He/she may try to shock you with real or fanciful stories to see if you condemn him/her as a person. Disagree with what he/she has done, but don't reject him/her. Accept him/her as a person; reject his/her sins.

6. Keep confidences. What is told in confidence is a God-given responsibility.
7. Be honest! Kids/teens spot phoniness quickly.
8. Be available and approachable at all times.
9. By faith, commit your campers to the Lord. Trust Him to work in their lives, to give insight, motivation, and change. You might make the camper conform, but only the Holy Spirit brings about the needed inner change, so trust Him to work through you.

DAILY RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE STAFF/COACH

1. Be up before campers. Get dressed quickly and be prepared to help younger campers get started with their day.
2. Go with your campers to breakfast. Remember we all go to breakfast whether we eat or not. Encourage each camper to eat something so as not to get sick. Sit with your campers when you are not helping with the serving. Engage your campers in conversation.
3. Be on time for staff meetings (time will be announced). Attendance is required. Because of our need to be with the campers continually, collective staff time is difficult to obtain. The director or assistant director may meet with you individually or with a small group.
4. Go with your group of campers to each of their activities. Be ready to assist the person in charge of each activity and encourage each camper to participate.
5. Recreation. Remember, Alaska's Native kids/teens are not necessarily competitively oriented. However, encourage participation, enthusiasm and patience. Give good instruction concerning participation.
6. Quiet time means quiet time.
7. Cleanliness is a relative term. Understand this. Encourage each camper to be clean and neat at all times. Younger campers may need assistance. **WATCH TOUCHING AS THIS IS A SENSITIVE AREA TODAY.**
8. Be on time for evening service and sit with your campers, ready to minister to them, especially around the altar or make explanations as necessary. Try to know why your camper went to the altar—go with him/her.
9. Encourage campers to use restrooms prior to classes and services.
10. Kids/teens from Alaska's villages may not be accustomed to going to bed at designated times, due to 24 hours of daylight in the summer. However, in order to keep any resemblance of a schedule, this will be necessary. Be prepared to gently enforce "lights out" for you and your campers.

GENERAL DUTIES

1. Arrive at camp ready to work and minister.
2. Acquaint yourself with the camp rules and schedules.
3. Introduce yourself to your campers and assist them in finding their tents.
4. Seek to know each camper personally.
5. Be alert for areas of spiritual, physical, emotional, or social needs. Not all campers have problems, but for those who do, camp can be the means of victory.
6. Be responsible for proper order and conduct of your group.
7. Get your campers out in force to the first scheduled activity of the day.
8. Gently stress the attendance requirement for classes, activities and evening services.
9. Remind the campers to keep their tent and surrounding area clean at all times.
10. **Sit and pray with your campers during each service.**
11. **Sit with campers during mealtime.**
12. Share meaningful spiritual experiences with your group.
13. Never show favoritism. Treat all campers alike.
14. Be loyal to camp spirit and philosophy.
15. Know where each one of your campers is at all times.
16. Support and enforce the camp policies and regulations as stated herein, regardless of your personal feelings in the matter.
17. Dissenting opinions are to be voiced privately to the camp director or assistant director
18. Never discuss your personal feelings of disagreement with the leadership and program in the presence of your campers.
19. Do your best to help keep the camp on schedule.
20. Be physically fit to perform the duties expected of you. Notify the camp director or assistant director of any physical problems previous to camp.
21. Attend all staff meetings and be on time.
22. **Prepare neatly and accurately all reports.**
23. **DO NOT MINISTER ANY MEDICATIONS, even aspirin — No exception.** There is a camp nurse and all medications, illnesses, accidents, etc. should be referred to the camp nurse first and then to the camp director or assistant director
24. Work in full cooperation with camp director, assistant director and staff. Ensure that all campers leave with all his/her belongings. See that your area(s) of the camp is left clean.

RELATIONSHIPS

The coaches are the keys to a successful camp. The camp director and assistant director are relying on you to see that the camp runs smoothly.

Your relationship to the Camp Director and Assistant Director — You have a responsibility to the camp director and assistant director as they coordinate the total staff. The ultimate responsibility for the camp rests with them. They expect you to know your job and do it. They will expect you to pitch in where extra help is needed. Don't wait to be told to do something — volunteer. Bring your questions to the right authority rather than discussing them with other staff members.

Your relationship to other staff members — Assume your share of the load, even the unpleasant tasks. A word of appreciation to the kitchen staff, other personnel, speakers/teachers/etc. will brighten their day. Assist in maintaining complete safety and avoidance of waterfront activity. Alaska's waters are extremely cold — accidents can be fatal. Avoid cliques or gossiping. This is not a time for staff romance, conduct yourself properly at all times. Pray one for the other!

Your relationship to the campers — The campers are the only reason Camp Agaiutim Nune exists. You will be their friend, guide, authority — don't violate or betray it. You are directly responsible for their health and safety. Encourage good table and social manners. Enforce quiet time — both you and the camper need the sleep or rest. Make sure each camper has a great time. Camp is for the campers.

Your relationship to your assigned group — Minister to each camper in your group. Develop a sense of belonging. Each camper has something to contribute to the group. Seek to discover this and encourage its development. Each camper is different, seek to discover and encourage each camper to develop his/herself to God's highest designs for them. Encourage each camper, at the beginning of the week, to set goals for themselves. Encourage each camper to participate in the camp activities, some will be shy and will need this encouragement. NEVER make fun or ridicule. Guide them into areas he/she can successfully participate.

Make this a time of interaction and fun. Seek to develop an attitude and atmosphere of acceptance. Encourage your group to demonstrate love and compassion toward each other. Let the group share in concern and prayer for the needs of each other.

DISCIPLINE OF CAMPERS

1. Coaches are encouraged to learn why your troublemaker is troubled. Is he/she seeking recognition? Does he/she feel inferior? Does he/she have physical disabilities? Vision problems? Hearing defects?
2. All discipline is to be administered in a spirit of love...never in anger. (Ps. 6:1; Prov.15:1; Eph. 6:4).
3. Never resort to sarcasm.
4. Never threaten, scold, or discipline a camper in the presence of other campers, or staff — embarrassing him/her.
5. NEVER administer physical discipline. Corporal (any physical punishment such as paddling) punishment is **NOT** an option.
6. Avoid frequent warnings. Face up to your problem. If you do not, they will override you.
7. If at all possible, deal with your problems personally. Do not allow your campers to feel that you cannot handle the situation. You may need advice; seek out counsel, then deal with the problem yourself.
8. Never make outlandish demands. Such demands are usually pronounced in a fit of anger. If you are emotionally upset, say nothing. Cool off — this will give you time to think about the problem.
9. Do not beg. Such phrases as “This is God’s camp,” “Jesus is watching you,” do no good. Campers who are disruptive are not concerned with reverence.
10. Avoid being one of the gang. You are an adult. Be yourself, and the campers will love you for it.
11. Never argue with a camper. When you enter a power struggle, you may win the debate, but you will never win control and respect.
12. Never discipline because you want to get even.
13. Never punish the entire group for one camper’s infraction. Deal with the troublemaker.
14. When discipline is administered, make sure that the camper understands why he/she is being punished.
15. The decision to return the camper to his/her parents will rest only with the camp director and assistant director.

Notice to ALL Camp Agaiutim Nune workers regarding Dress Code

If you are coming with a team, we are asking the team leaders to help each of their team to understand the significance of this and to help ensure these rules are followed.

The minds and lives of the kids and teens that Camp AN ministers to are bombarded by everything Satan has to influence for sin. These kids/teens are influence by everything on satellite TV, videos and internet. One of the great pieces of spiritual armor that Paul gave us under the direction of the Holy Spirit is the “Helmet of Salvation”. Its purpose to protect the head, that “control center” of our bodies. The “eye gate” is a powerful access into our influences. It is important that the few days of influence that God gives us with these kids and teens is as guarded as we can be. We have been careful to alert you during our times of “orientation” concerning bodily contact and its emotional implications and I want to stress the following, also, as you are preparing to arrive at camp. Please be modest in all your dress--comfortable but conservative. Ladies please avoid tight clothing pants or tops—these can be suggestive. Your body is the Lord’s and is also to be preserved for your marriage and not as an object of observance by others. I realize we live in a far less modest world today; but, your presence on the property of Camp AN is a ministry and testimony. Everything about us must exemplify Christ and His Word.

Girls:

1. Outfits that reveal mid-drift, cleavage or underwear are not considered modest. These are all pretty simple and easy to follow. No tank tops except when swimming to cover a 2 piece swim suit.
2. Please make sure your slacks are at least knee length. No shorts. Cover up those tight pants and leggings. Not all

leggings are created equal and we've experienced too many that leave nothing to the imagination so PLEASE put a long t-shirt to cover your back-side if you want to wear spandex or leggings. No mini-skirts.

3. When swimming wear a one piece swim suit if possible. If you have a two piece swim suit, wear a t-shirt or tank top over it. Swim suits are to be worn for swimming only. Tankinis are acceptable too.

Guys:

1. Please make sure your slacks are at least knee length. No shorts. No tight pants.
2. When swimming wear a swim suit or suitable shorts. Swim suits are to be worn for swimming only. No tank tops except when swimming.
3. When you leave your dorm, you MUST have a shirt on. Outfits that reveal mid-drift, or underwear are not considered modest. No tank tops except for swimming.

We deeply appreciate each of you and the sacrifice you are making financially, physically, timewise and spiritually to minister to the lives of those in western Alaska for eternity. Camp AN could not exist without the volunteer staff that comes each year. Please be earnestly in prayer for the lives of the campers this summer to whom you will be ministering. Pastor Terry Hull will be alerting you to a time of prayer prior to camp.

Leading a Child to Christ

Child evangelism is not only a special privilege, but a grave responsibility as well. The invitation to accept Christ must be clearly given for the child to understand the decision you are asking him/her to make.

Use your Bible in dealing with the child, turning to each verse you use. Have a child read it for you if he is able. If not, read the verse to him. (You may prefer to use a paraphrased version.)

The steps in leading a child to Christ are simple:

HE/SHE MUST REALIZE HIS/HER NEED OF SALVATION.

Read Romans 3:23. This means that every person has sinned. What is sin? (The child's response will tell you a great deal about his/her understanding of sin.) Sin is anything we do (or fail to do) that displeases God. It may be laziness, disobedience, lying, or any other bad thing.

The Bible also tells us that we must be punished for our sins. Read Romans 6:23. What are wages? (Let the child respond.) Wages are the money we earn when we work for someone. This verse means we have earned punishment for our sins. We deserve to die for our sins.

HE/SHE MUST SEE THE WAY OF SALVATION.

How may we receive the wonderful gift of salvation? Turn to John 3:16. God sent His Son Jesus to be our Savior. Jesus died on the cross to pay for our sins. He took the punishment we have earned. He paid for the gift of salvation by dying on the cross in our place. All we must do to receive salvation is to ask Jesus to forgive us and to become our Savior.

HE/SHE MUST ACCEPT JESUS AS HIS/HER OWN SAVIOUR.

All anyone must do to have Jesus be his/her Savior is just to tell Him so; to ask Him to come into his/her heart. (Explain that when we use the term heart we are not talking about the physical heart that pumps blood through our veins, but about the real person we are—the part of us that loves and hates, the part of us that keeps on living even when our bodies have died.)

Encourage the child to talk to God in his/her own words. In the event he/she is reluctant to pray, you might suggest he/she follow you in a prayer such as this: "Dear Jesus, I know I am a sinner. I am sorry for all the bad things I have done. Please forgive me and take my sins away. Please come into my heart and be my Savior. Thank you for dying on the cross for me. Thank you for making me a member of Your family. Amen." Give him/her Scripture verses that will assure him/her of his/her salvation. (1 John 5:13 and Philippians 1:6 are especially good.)

ENCOURAGE HIM/HER TO TELL OTHERS WHAT JESUS HAS DONE FOR HIM/HER.

Let him/her begin by telling you in his/her own words how he/she knows Jesus is his/her Savior. If necessary, gently question him/her in order to get him/her to express him/herself. "Did Jesus forgive your sins? How do you know?" and so on. If he/she has no Bible, make sure that the camper get one of the New Testaments the camp provides. You may wish to have several on hand in which you have marked the verses you used in leading him/her to the Lord.

LET HIM/HER KNOW THAT GOD WANTS TO BE HIS/HER HELPER.

Since he/she has become a member of God's family, the child will have God for his/her helper. God will help him/her do the things that are right.

Suggest he/she read his/her Bible every day (or have it read to him/her.) When we ask Jesus to be our Savior, He cleanses us from sin. But we need to talk with Him each day and ask Him to help us to please Him.

Impress on him/her the thought that to keep our bodies clean, it is necessary for us to bathe often. In order for us to have clean hearts, we must pray and read God's Word often. When we sin, we must pray and ask God to forgive us and to help us to not do it again. (Read 1 John 1:19.)

Encourage the child to attend Sunday School and church as often as possible. This will help him/her learn more about Jesus and become a stronger Christian. Keep in touch with the child you have led to Christ.

Just as a newborn infant needs nourishment and tender, loving care, the newborn Christian must be spiritually nurtured and cared for. Pray for him/her. Be available as a friend. Encourage him/her by your loving concern for him/her and by your own good example.

BAPTISM IN THE HOLY SPIRIT

Scriptures:

Encourage each camper to have a relationship with the Holy Spirit. Help them to understand that the relationship with the Holy Spirit is based on a relationship with Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit's working in us will affect our daily living, personal and public devotion and worship, and our involvement with those who do not know Jesus As Savior. Each camper will develop their own response and "style" of worship, in accordance with the Scripture, as they "grow" in the Lord.

HEALING

Health is important. Many people take vitamins to be healthy. Some people go to health clubs to exercise and they stay fit. Health is important. Have you ever been sick? Sure you have, we all have.

God will take care of us when we are sick. The Bible tells us:

(Isa 53:5 NIV) But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed.

(Jer 30:17 NIV) But I will restore you to health and heal your wounds,' declares the LORD, 'because you are called an outcast, Zion for whom no one cares.'

(James 5:15 NIV) And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well; the Lord will raise him up. If he has sinned, he will be forgiven.

(James 5:16 NIV) Therefore confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous man is powerful and effective.

(1 Pet 2:24 NIV) He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed.

We must pray for one another when there is sickness. Prayer is important in God's healing of us. We should also ask for forgiveness of our sins, so that sin won't keep us from being healed. Remember to pray for one another during illness.
